## CALLS FOR SERVICE BILLING WORKGROUPS



**Drugs** Includes trafficking, production, and importation of drugs including marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substances. It also includes occurrences related to indoor/outdoor grow labs.

**Drug Possession** Includes all occurrences where the most serious violation is possession of marihuana, cocaine, heroin, crystal meth or other controlled substance. It also includes other minor drug related offences.

**Operational** Operational calls for service are non-criminal events that police attend to. These include animal complaints, non- criminal domestic disturbances, missing persons, noise complaints, property – lost or found, sudden deaths, and assist public calls.

**Operational 2** Includes false alarms, keep the peace and 911 calls/911 hang-ups. Due to the higher frequency of these calls, they have been separated out from the 'Operational' category and allocated a lower time standard. Traffic incidents are excluded.

**Other Criminal Code Violations** The majority of offences counted in the Other Criminal Code Offences group are criminal offences that are not directed to people or related to property. It is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Other Criminal Code'. These include prostitution, offensive weapons, bail violations, counterfeiting, disturb the peace, indecent acts, breach of probation, and bribery.

**Property Crime Violations** This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Property Crimes'. These include arson, break and enter, theft, possession of stolen goods, mischief, identity theft, and some frauds.

**Statutes & Acts** Includes provincial statutes, primarily the Mental Health Act, Landlord Tenant Act and Trespass to property offences. It also includes custody dispute calls.

**Traffic** Includes motor vehicle collisions of all severities (property damage, personal injury and fatalities) and road rage incidents reported to police.

**Violent Crimes** The majority of offences counted in the Violent Crimes group are crimes against persons. This category is similar to the group that Statistics Canada uses when reporting 'Violent Crimes'. These include homicides, attempted murders, assaults, threats and robberies.



- Data groupings within this report do not match traditional crime groupings seen in other public reports such as the OPP Police Services Board reports or Statistics Canada reporting.







## Middlesex Major Crime Unit

#### **Benchmark Occurrences**



During the reporting period, 17 Benchmark occurrences were reported in Thames Centre. Of these, there were 4 sudden deaths, 5 sexual assaults, 1 possession of stolen property, 1 luring minors over the internet, 2 frauds, 2 drug offences, 1 break & enter, and 1 assault.

Throughout Middlesex County, 85 Benchmark occurrences were reported.

- 27 were categorized as Crime Leads.
- 37 were designated as Crime Assists.
- 16 were related to Sexual Assaults.
- Additionally, there were 24 investigations into sudden deaths. All of them except for one, were deemed non- suspicious and non-criminal. There was one homicide investigation conducted in collaboration with the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch.
- Currently the Middlesex Major Crime Unit, under the leadership of the OPP's Criminal Investigations Bureau, is involved in four homicide investigations and one attempt murder investigation. Each of these are in various stages of progression.
- Middlesex Major Crime coordinated investigation with the Oneida First Nation Police Service into an elder abuse, Power of Attorney (POA) fraud. The Office of the Public Guardian and Trustee has been engaged to assist.
- Middlesex Major Crime Unit collaborated with the OPP Child Sexual Exploitation Unit to investigate an occurrence involving a young person. Arrangements were made to commit a sexual offence. This included the production and distribution of child pornography, and luring minors over the internet for a sexual purpose. The investigation resulted in the successful identification and arrest of two accused parties who resided in separate jurisdictions.
- Middlesex Major Crime Unit collaborated with the OPP Child Sexual Exploitation Unit to investigate an occurrence of a young person - arrangement to commit a sexual offence, making and distribution of child pornography, and luring minors over the internet for a sexual purpose. The investigation resulted in the successful identification and arrest of two accused party in separate jurisdictions.

## Middlesex Major Crime Unit



We currently have 41 total offenders on the OMAP (Offender Management Apprehension Program), which is a program for monitoring and apprehending offenders with charges that do not involve firearms or are released on a form of release. Middlesex OPP members actively check 18 offenders who live within Middlesex County and the three Indigenous communities.

#### **Bail Compliance Dashboard**

Bail Compliance Dashboard is a Bail program involving firearm and weapon related offences. Offenders can only be added to the Bail Compliance Dashboard (BCD) if they are released on a FORM 11 with firearm and weapon offences. These offenders can be found on the Bail compliance dashboard on the officer's workstations, and work cell phones. Currently within Middlesex County there are four individuals contained within this dashboard.

## Community Street Crime Unit



The information contained in this report outlines data from September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2023 to December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2023 for Middlesex County. The Middlesex CSCU team works collaboratively with the Elgin County Community Street Crime Unit.

- CSCU was involved in forty-seven (47) incidents during this reporting period. These incidents ranged from assault, break and enter, drug offences, stolen property, stolen vehicles, theft, sudden death, and weapons related offences.
- CSCU was involved in executing and or assisting with six (6) search warrants in Middlesex County and the surrounding OPP/Municipal policing areas. These investigations primarily focused on stolen property, drugs, and firearms.
- CSCU members have authored thirty (30) other types of judicial authorization that include search warrants (residence, phones etc), production orders, and tracking warrants.
- CSCU members continue to assume a leadership role in addressing community concerns over illicit drug activity within Oneida Nation of the Thames, Chippewa of the Thames First Nation, and Munsee-Delaware First Nation.
- CSCU was contacted by uniform officers after they investigated a motor vehicle collision that took place in Thames Centre. The officers searched the vehicle incident to arrest and located a quantity of illicit drugs. The subsequent seizure allowed CSCU to author and obtain a search warrant related to a drug trafficking investigation. This investigation resulted in the seizure of a quantity of cocaine and prescription drugs (not prescribed to the suspect). The suspect was charged accordingly.
- CSCU continues to work in conjunction with Provincial auto theft investigators to address
  ongoing concerns relating to property crime and in particular motor vehicle thefts. For
  example, during this reporting period Middlesex CSCU assisted York Regional Police with an
  auto-theft investigation where two (2) stolen vehicles from the GTA were being stored in
  Middlesex County.

## Community Services Officer / Media

#### Middlesex OPP - Thames Centre - Key Stats



Over the reporting period of September 1, 2023, to December 31, 2023, the Middlesex OPP responded to just over 4,527 calls for service in Thames Centre. Of those calls, 1,646 E-Tickets were issued to drivers on our roads and highways and 498 Traffic Complaints were received. 110 Motor-vehicle collisions were reported, 14 break and enters, 10 stolen vehicles, 39 Impaired/Over 80 charges were laid, and 135 RIDE Programs were initiated.

Focused Patrols specifically enforcing speeding and school bus safety laws were conducted throughout this reporting period. This includes along Harrietsville Drive and Westchester Bourne Road, amongst other areas. These safety-based initiatives continue as a means of addressing community concerns and optimizing public safety.

#### **Media Relations:**

Middlesex OPP continues to utilize our local area media partners as well as technology provided through social media platforms, to assist with on-going investigations and to keep our community informed. During this reporting period, Middlesex OPP have completed more than 200 Media releases to over 356 media outlet sources. Additionally, social media has been utilized to support public safety and awareness messaging. This includes 83 Tweets on the X platform (reaching over 74 thousand subscribers), posts on Facebook (102,000 followers), and on Instagram (6,500 followers).



## Traffic Safety Summary

#### **Enforcement Statistics:**

• Throughout Middlesex County, a total of 2946 Provincial Offence Notices (PON) were issued, representing a 25% increase from 2022.



- Within Thames Centre, a total of 1646 Provincial Offence Notices (PON) were issued, representing a 21% increase from 2022.
- During the Operation Impact Traffic Safety Campaign (Oct 6-9, 2023), Middlesex members issued 581 PON's. This included 300 for excessive speed, 16 for failing to wear a seatbelt, 7 distracted driving, and 7 impaired driving charges.
- Within Thames Centre, a total of 235 PONs were issued during this campaign.

#### RIDE:

 During this reporting period 389 RIDE checks were completed in Middlesex County. This included 135 RIDE's within Thames Centre.

#### Impaired Driving Offences:

• During this reporting period 39 impaired driving charges were laid within Middlesex County. This includes 15 within Thames Centre. This represents a 17% decrease in Thames Centre from 2022.

#### **Collision Summary:**

• During this reporting period Middlesex OPP responded to 700 motor vehicle collisions. 110 of these collisions occurred within Thames Centre.







#### If you call 9-1-1 for an emergency:

- Listen to the call takers instructions depending on the location and type of incident, you may be transferred.
- Stay on the line until advised to hang up.

#### **CITIZENS SELF REPORTING:**

You have the option to report select occurrences to the OPP from your computer or mobile device using the OPP's <u>Citizen Self Reporting</u> system.

Use this system to report:

- 1. Lost/missing property under \$5,000
- 2. Stolen license plates or validation stickers
- 3. Theft from a vehicle under \$5,000
- 4. Mischief/damage to a vehicle under \$5,000
- 5. Mischief/damage to property (other than a vehicle) under \$5,000
- 6. Theft under \$5,000
- 7. Driving Complaint

#### FRONTLINE SUPPORT UNIT (FSU):

The Frontline Support Unit (FSU) program is a differential response strategy that focuses on call management. This includes responsibility for the OPP's Citizen Self-Reporting (CSR) system which is an online police reporting system for members of the public to report specific occurrences directly to the OPP via the Internet. The FSU model will offer a call handling alternative for select calls for service allowing the deployment of resources to critical incidents or member engagement in proactive police activities. Through the use of technology, the OPP continues to improve our processes and service delivery in support of its vision.
